1. Pledge of Allegiance

The Pledge was recited.

2. Approval of the Agenda for May 1, 2018 (Non-action item)

Tim Sutton said items 5 and 12-14 could be removed from the agenda.

3. GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT (Three-minute time limit per person.) Action will not be taken on the matters considered during this period until specifically included on an agenda as an action item (first).

Diane Southworth said she went to the annual picnic for Valley Electric where there was a wonderful inspirational speaker. She also commented on the fact that they got the go ahead for their center and it was absolutely gorgeous.

Richard Goldstein said the Boy Scout Troop would have an all you can eat pancake breakfast at the Wild West Extravaganza on Saturday from 7:30 a.m. to about 11:00 a.m. at a cost of \$5.00 per person. He then inquired about the fountain at the Calvada Eye which Valley Electric Association had volunteered to redo as nothing had happened.

Debra Strickland announced the hearing for Order 1293 which Pahrump Fair Water was pursuing was set for May 10, 2018, at the Pahrump Justice Court on Basin. The lawyer would be Judge Maddox.

Butch Borasky sat at the public table to address the Board as he was sitting as a private individual, not as a County Commissioner. He commented on how strong the winds must be in Tonopah because it blew two of his signs away along with stakes that could not be pulled out of the ground. He hoped whoever took them were happy and were putting them to good use.

Dave Stevens talked about the petition to ban brothels in the County. He said he signed it and urged everyone else to sign it also.

4. Commissioner Wichman made a motion to approve; seconded by Commissioner Borasky; 5 yeas.

SITTING AS THE NYE COUNTY BOARD OF HIGHWAY COMMISSIONERS

Commissioner Schinhofen assumed the Chair of the Board of Highway Commissioners.

10. General road report by Acting Public Works Director.

Commissioner Cox asked to have someone look at the big patch of Dandelion by the corner of Mount Charleston that was coming apart.

Commissioner Borasky talked about the right-of-ways in Pahrump that had bushes and trees growing in them and said he would like to see a plan on how the Road Department would deal with that.

Acting Public Works Director Tim Dahl advised there were two mowers working the valley at this moment and it was just a matter of time until they got to all of them. However, if there were specific locations Commissioner Borasky could help identify Mr. Dahl said he would appreciate that.

Commissioner Borasky said he would provide pictures and he was talking about trees, not bushes.

Commissioner Wichman told Mr. Dahl she thought the sign at the 90 degree curve on Toquima Range Road was knocked over when they bladed last time and asked him to look into it.

Commissioner Koenig said he sent an e-mail to Mr. Dahl about a road in Amargosa. A was gentleman complaining that the County had taken it over years ago and never bladed.

Mr. Dahl said that was on their maintenance list and would be taken care of.

Commissioner Koenig said quite a while ago he complained to NDOT that when they re-did Highway 160 coming into Pahrump from the north the speed went down to 45 mph. At that time there was a sign warning of that reduced speed ahead, but now it just went from 55 mph to 45 mph with no warning. He had asked them to put a sign back and there was still no sign so he would like that sign put back.

Commissioner Schinhofen mentioned the bamboo at Manse and Homestead was growing back again and blocking the line of sight. Additionally, the County did not accept the dedication to maintain the Vineyard Subdivision off Winery Road and he asked Mr. Dahl to please bring that forward for the Board to accept because the roads there were cracking.

Mr. Dahl advised he had already prepared an agenda item for that.

Commissioner Wichman asked for an update on the "Round Mountain Gold 3 Miles" sign.

10. General road report by Acting Public Works Director-Cont'd.

Mr. Dahl said he did not have much of an update. He prepared an exhibit for Sami Yousuf at NDOT to forward to his traffic engineers to consider putting up and he had not heard back yet.

Commissioner Schinhofen asked that Mr. Dahl get the bids out for Pablo Canyon, Belmont, and Valley View in Tonopah to get them done before winter.

Commissioner Koenig assumed the Chair of the Board of County Commissioners.

11. Commissioner Schinhofen made a motion to 1) enter into an agreement with Kofax Mobile for fire apparatus utilizing the interlocal purchasing cooperative agreement and 2) approve the cost of the apparatus not to exceed \$650,000.00; seconded by Commissioner Wichman.

Commissioner Wichman asked if this was for the FY18 or FY19 PSST.

Fire Chief Scott Lewis explained it was actually first done in 2017 and was a carry over.

The motion to 1) enter into an agreement with Kofax Mobile for fire apparatus utilizing the interlocal purchasing cooperative agreement and 2) approve the cost of the apparatus not to exceed \$650,000.00 passed with 5 yeas.

Commissioner Borasky made a motion to adopt; seconded by Commissioner Wichman; 5 yeas.

18. For Possible Action – Discussion and deliberation pursuant to NRS 244.360(5) to: 1) direct the District Attorney to notify the person responsible for the nuisance to abate said nuisance as set forth in the complaint received by the County Clerk on April 19, 2018, regarding APN 006-302-07, 17 Mahogany Boulevard, Round Mountain, Nevada and a) determine and specify a reasonable time for the person to abate said nuisance and b) direct the District Attorney to bring legal proceedings for abatement of said nuisance if the notice to the person responsible fails to abate said nuisance; or, in the alternative 2) pursuant to NRS 244.360(1) and 244.360(2), direct the Clerk to set a public hearing not less than 30 nor more than 40 days subsequent to the filing of the complaint.

Commissioner Wichman made a motion to direct the Clerk to set a public hearing not less than 30 nor more than 40 days subsequent to the filing of the complaint and add this to the May 22, 2018, agenda; seconded by Commissioner Cox; 5 yeas.

Commissioner Wichman stated her belief that this had been done in the past and was found to be a nuisance. She wondered if it had to be done again or if the County could just go forward with abating the issue and putting a lien on the property.

Commissioner Wichman made a motion to approve; seconded by Commissioner Schinhofen.

Commissioner Cox noted the amount of money being put out to collect the money. She asked if the County was getting ahead of the game or if maybe that money should be donated to people who did not get their child support.

Angela Bello explained the wages were controlled by State law and her office was just a pass through.

The motion to approve passed with 5 yeas.

SHERIFF

20. For Possible Action – Discussion and deliberation regarding a renewal of a Wholesale/Retail Fireworks Permit for Alamo Fireworks located at 2641 E Highway 95 in Amargosa Valley, NV. Patrick James – Applicant

Commissioner Schinhofen made a motion to approve renewal of a wholesale/retail fireworks permit for Alamo Fireworks; seconded by Commissioner Wichman; 5 yeas.

21. For Possible Action – Discussion and deliberation to issue a Display Fireworks Event Permit to the Town of Tonopah to do an Aerial Display for their annual Fourth of July Event on Wednesday, July 4, 2018. This event is being held at the Joe Friel Sports Complex in Tonopah, NV. Kat Galli – Applicant.

Commissioner Schinhofen made a motion to approve; seconded by Commissioner Wichman; 5 yeas.

COUNTY MANAGER

22. County Health Rankings Report

Lorina Dellinger said the report was released on March 14, 2018, and Nye County ranked last as it had for the last several years. She received a request from the County Health Officer to convene as the Board of Health at a future date to schedule a workshop to discuss the needs and moving forward to improve the health of the County. The workshop would include the public.

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT

23. Presentation regarding the Tonopah Ambulance Service status.

Emergency Services Director Vance Payne advised there were no major changes at the Tonopah ambulance. There were improvements in coverage on the schedule, but there were holes because of the lack of personnel. It was a major improvement having REMSA in town and the community paramedic had also made a profound difference already. Mr. Payne said there would be a meeting later today to discuss the entire issue with them and he hoped to have some good news when that was done.

FINANCE

24. For Possible Action – Discussion and deliberation regarding the budget status through March 2018 for Nye County and all sub-entities for fiscal year 2018.

Savannah Rucker said the first page of the back-up was the County's budget to actual revenue report, which summarized revenues received to date and showed 67.5% received at 75% of the fiscal year elapsed. She pointed out that the percent of revenues received was catching up to the fiscal year elapsed and by the end of the year would meet or exceed that.

The next page was the department summary through March 31, 2018. Mrs. Rucker reminded the Board of the budget clean-up item about a month ago that cleared up a lot of the projected overages. She reviewed the reasons for the overages in Planning, the Mechanics Department, Emergency Management, Treasurer's Office, District Attorney, Child Legal, Sheriff's Office, and Miscellaneous Overhead, along with her plans to

augment/adjust each as needed. Other funds that needed support from the general fund were Emergency Services and the Building Department. Outside of those two funds Mrs. Rucker said everything looked great. The County was right in line where it was supposed to be and she had no concerns with any other funds.

Commissioner Wichman mentioned the need for someone to look at the Manhattan and Gabbs utility funds to see if the incoming rates would cover what was needed in the future.

Mrs. Rucker advised when she met with the Gabbs Town Advisory Board she discussed that with them and the problems with it. She would work with Administration to possibly bring something to the Board to provide a solution for that.

25. For Possible Action – Discussion and deliberation to approve a grant extension for the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Well Complex. Grant Extension #2 Grants a three (3) month extension through June 30, 2018 to allow time for final documents to be accepted and closed out per the grant requirements.

Commissioner Schinhofen made a motion to approve the extension; seconded by Commissioner Wichman; 5 yeas.

26. For Possible Action – Discussion and deliberation to accept the fee schedule presented by BEC Environmental, Inc. for services regarding RFQ #2018-03. This project is to be funded from Fund 10340 Grants.

Commissioner Schinhofen made a motion to approve the fee schedule; seconded by Commissioner Wichman; 5 yeas.

27. For Possible Action – Discussion and deliberation regarding approval to: 1) enter into a contract with Atkins North America, Inc. to provide Construction Management services to reconstruct Taxiway A at the Tonopah Airport – Task 2 of the 2018 Airport Capital Improvement Plan (ACIP) project for \$214,000.00; 2) execute the contract; and 3) Fund \$200,625.00 from 10340 Grants and \$13,375.00 from 10402 Special Capital Projects.

Commissioner Wichman made a motion to approve entering into the contract with Atkins, execute the contract, and fund \$200,625.00 from 10340, Grants, and \$13,375.00 from 10402, Special Capital Projects; seconded by Commissioner Schinhofen; 5 yeas.

28. For Possible Action – Discussion and deliberation regarding approval to: 1) enter into a contract with Atkins North America, Inc. to provide Construction Management services to rehabilitate Taxiway B and Aircraft Apron – Task 3 of the 2018 Tonopah Airport Capital Improvement Plan (ACIP) project for \$23,850.00; 2) execute the contract; and 3) Fund \$22,359.00 from 10340 Grants and \$1,491.00 from 10402 Special Capital Projects.

Commissioner Wichman made a motion to approve entering into the contract with Atkins North America, execute the contract and fund \$22,359.00 from Grants and \$1,491.00 from Special Capital Projects; seconded by Commissioner Schinhofen; 5 years.

29. For Possible Action – Discussion and deliberation regarding a request to: 1) award a contract to Qualcon Contractors, Inc. in the amount of \$1,895,497.00 for rehabilitating the Tonopah Taxiway A contingent on Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) approval; 2) Fund \$1,777,028.00 from 10340 Grants and \$118,469.00 from 10402 Special Capital Projects; and 3) authorize the County Manager to execute the grant award when it is received from the FAA.

Commissioner Wichman made a motion to award the contract to Qualcon Contractors, to fund \$1,777,028.00 from Grants and \$118,469.00 from Special Capital Projects, and authorize the County Manager to execute the grant award when received from the FAA; seconded by Commissioner Schinhofen; 5 years.

30. For Possible Action – Discussion and deliberation regarding a request to: 1) award a contract to Maxwell Asphalt in the amount of \$124,134.45 for rehabilitating the Tonopah Taxiway B contingent on Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) approval; 2) Fund \$116,376.00 from 10340 Grants and \$7,758.45 from 10402 Special Capital Projects; and 3) authorize the County Manager to execute the grant award when it is received from the FAA.

Commissioner Wichman made a motion to award the contract to Maxwell Asphalt contingent on Federal Aviation Administration approval, fund \$116,376.00 from Grants and \$7,758.45 from Special Capital Projects, and authorize the County Manager to execute the grant when received from the FAA; seconded by Commissioner Schinhofen; 5 years.

PLANNING/BUILDING/CODE COMPLIANCE

31. For Possible Action – Discussion and deliberation regarding a request to: 1) Set a date, time and location for a Public Hearing on Nye County Bill No. 2018-07: A Bill proposing to amend Nye County Code Title 17, Comprehensive Land Use Planning and Zoning, by adding Section 17.04.820 relating to the standards for the placement of Manufactured Homes; and providing for the severability, constitutionality and effective date thereof; and other matters properly relating thereto; and 2) Read the title of the Bill into the record.

Commissioner Schinhofen made a motion to set the date, time and location for June 5, 2018, at 11:00 a.m. in Tonopah; seconded by Commissioner Wichman.

Dwight Lilly said the proposed changes created for all intents and purposes a government mandated homeowners association. He was informed this was only to set a date and time and his comments were off topic.

The motion to set the date, time and location for June 5, 2018, at 11:00 a.m. in Tonopah passed with 5 yeas.

Commissioner Schinhofen read the title of the bill into the record.

PUBLIC PETITIONER

32. 10:30 – For Possible Action – Presentation from the Nevada Chapter of the American Planning Association and the Nevada Leadership Program-UCED regarding the February 2017 Nevada Planning Guide and professional development opportunities offered by the Chapter and the Nevada Leadership Program.

Fred Steinmann, Assistant Research Professor with the University Center for Economic Development, part of the College of Business at the University of Nevada-Reno and the Chapter Secretary of the Nevada Chapter of the American Planning Association, presented the Commissioners with a copy of the February, 2017, Nevada Planning Guide. The Nevada Planning Guide was the culmination of about two years of research and update to the Chapter's existing Planning Commissioner's Handbook originally published in 1999. Given the development and activity in the State Mr. Steinmann said they felt 20 years was too long to wait to update it so they published the Planning Guide itself.

Mr. Steinmann said both the Chapter and the Center for Economic Development at UNR shared the same mission – to provide educational opportunities to Nevada's elected and appointed officials, government executives and members of the public when it came to various issues related to planning and economic development. The guide was designed to do just that by translating Nevada economic development and planning law into understandable words, concepts and best practices.

TIMED ITEMS

7. 11:00 – For Possible Action – Public Hearing, discussion and deliberation to: 1) Adopt, amend and adopt, or reject Nye County Bill No. 2018-11: A Bill proposing to amend Nye County Code 17.04.770, the Signage Requirements applicable to the Pahrump Regional Planning District, by amending the section related to political signs; providing for the severability, constitutionality and effective date thereof; and other matters properly related thereto; and 2) Set an effective date.

Commissioner Koenig opened and closed the public hearing.

Ronni Boskovich said there were a couple of changes she would like to make on the record. On page 3 she would like the definition to read "any display or billboard used for the purpose of appealing or opposing directly or indirectly any candidate or political measure during an electoral campaign."

Commissioner Koenig said he had a problem with the word billboard as later on there was a discussion on how big the signs could be. He thought "billboard" should be stricken also.

Planning Director Brett Waggoner said the only thing being changed was adding the definition and verbiage for political signs and the size restraints were for political signs.

The second change Ms. Boskovich made was on page 5, section D.1.a, adding after the word pavement "and appropriately secured to the ground."

Commissioner Schinhofen made a motion to adopt; seconded by Commissioner Wichman.

Commissioner Borasky asked why State language on the signs was not being used.

Angela Bello pointed out it said they needed to follow State law as well.

Commissioner Cox said she had an issue with this only applying to political signs considering the majority of it looked like it was being done for safety purposes. She felt it should apply to all signs and said if it was amended to apply to all signs she would support it. If it only applied to political signs she would not.

Commissioner Koenig explained the whole sign ordinance was being rewritten and those would be taken into account. This was being done because theoretically most of the political signs right now were illegal.

The motion to adopt passed with 5 yeas. The effective date was set as May 21, 2018.

8. 11:00 – For Possible Action – Public Hearing, discussion and deliberation to: 1) Adopt, amend and adopt, or reject Nye County Bill No. 2018-13: A Bill proposing to amend Nye County Code 12.04.040, the Signage Requirements applicable to Nye County, by creating an exception related to political signs; providing for the severability, constitutionality and effective date thereof; and other matters properly related thereto; and 2) Set an effective date.

Commissioner Koenig opened and closed the public hearing.

Ronni Boskovich advised the title and summary needed to be changed by striking "Planning District" so it read simply "Nye County." Immediately after that "adding a section" needed to be stricken and "creating an exception" needed to be added. The last change was on page 2, subsection 1.A.1, after the word pavement "and appropriately secured to the ground" needed to be added.

Commissioner Schinhofen made a motion to adopt with an effective date of May 21, 2018; seconded by Commissioner Wichman; 5 yeas.

9. 11:00 – For Possible Action – Public Hearing, discussion and deliberation on Road Abandonment Application AB-18-000005: A request to vacate and abandon the right-of-way of an Unnamed Road sixty (60) feet in width and approximately 1,282 feet in length, located south of and adjacent to Assessor Parcel Number 021-431-03, and north of and adjacent to Assessor Parcel Number 021-431-04, situated between Appaloosa Lane and Corral Lane in Crystal, Nye County, Nevada. Crystal 40, LLC - Applicant. Dennis Hof – Agent. David A. Richards, P.L.S., Civilwise Services, Inc. – Land Surveyor.

Commissioner Koenig opened and closed the public hearing.

Commissioner Borasky stated he would not vote on this item per his attorney's advice.

Commissioner Schinhofen said he would vote on this issue. He took an oath to do this job which required voting. This was just land use, he had voted for people he liked and did not like, and he saw no conflict on this item.

Commissioner Wichman made a motion to grant the application to vacate and abandon the right-of-way and convert this to one parcel contingent upon following Title 9, Section 20.130.C., which outlined what signs could be put on the place, and all other signs had to be approved by this Board, meaning all of the signs in the right-of-way currently needed to be removed and any other signs on the property besides what was set out in the Code needed to be approved by the Board of County Commissioners, and that this was completed and done by the 21st as required in a previous meeting; seconded by Commissioner Schinhofen.

9. 11:00 – For Possible Action – Public Hearing, discussion and deliberation on Road Abandonment Application AB-18-000005-Cont'd.

Commissioner Cox questioned the concern about signs on private property in the strip they were abandoning. This was only the abandonment of the right-of-way that was dividing the two parcels, not Appaloosa Street.

Commissioner Wichman restated her motion to approve the request of the abandonment conditioned upon it being done by the 21st like it was originally supposed to be done and also following Code 9.20.130 which spelled out exactly what signs could be there and all other signs must be approved by the Board of County Commissioners, so they needed to either be removed from the right-of-ways and brought back to the Board of County Commissioners for approval or simply removed and left down.

Commissioner Cox was still confused about the need for this on private property.

Commissioner Wichman explained the part that was being abandoned had no signs on it. The problem she had was there were signs in the County right-of-way associated with this business that had not been removed and needed to be. Her motion was to approve this with that condition of approval.

Commissioner Koenig added the signs were a separate issue that he brought up when he allowed them to reopen and they still had a few days to satisfy that condition. Additionally, the road abandonment did not make it one parcel. The merger re-sub would and he asked if that had been done.

Planning Director Brett Waggoner said the merger re-sub would follow once this was approved and that right-of-way was abandoned.

Commissioner Cox asked if this meant they could never have a sign advertising the brothel.

Commissioner Koenig said no. It meant any future signs had to be approved by the Board.

The motion to approve the request of the abandonment conditioned upon it being done by the 21st and also following Code 9.20.130 which spelled out exactly what signs could be there and all other signs must be approved by the Board of County Commissioners, so they needed to either be removed from the right-of-ways and brought them back to the Board of County Commissioners for approval or simply removed and left down passed with 4 yeas. Commissioner Borasky abstained.

Dave Richards questioned why the condition of following the Code was added to this item.

33. GENERAL PUBLIC COMMENT (second)

Horace Carlyle thanked the Commissioners and staff for their help and support with the NDOT street project. With that support NDOT was convinced to go back and review some of their engineering figures and parameters. The project involved \$25 million in infrastructure improvements, particularly in a three mile stretch with water and sewer that dated back 50 to 100 years and the town was going to be responsible for any breaks, cracks or disruption in service. Mr. Carlyle said it was his understanding that NDOT had now agreed to assume that liability and responsibility. There was also a drainage area that was a threat to Highway 95 that for five years the Public Works Department had been setting aside \$400,000.00 for which had never been completed. If completed Mr. Carlyle said it would take away the risk of the slime wash and power poles ending up in the public roadway and would also make Tonopah more appealing for development.

Don Cox referred to the comment he made at the last meeting about Mr. Fairbairn. While he could accept the fact that Mr. Fairbairn was drunk and had said he wished he could take the statement back, Mr. Cox would not accept a church getting into politics as church and politics were not supposed to mix. He said the taxpayers would make up the loss of money if the brothels closed, not this church, and if people did not like brothels they could go back to where they came from.

Tina Trenner pointed out two teenagers in the community were lost in the last two weeks to suicide. She was desirous of finding an answer and would love to hear suggestions from the community.

Dwight Lilly did not think there was a lot of common sense going on and the focus seemed to be in anger and frustration on one specific business. He cautioned the Commissioners that when they started making special rules and motions with certain language if they did not hold every single business and citizen in the County to the same standards then they would discriminate against some people and subject themselves to lawsuits.

Leo Blundo read a statement from Nye Communities Coalition regarding Safe Talk training which connected people with thoughts of suicide to caregivers who could help them. If anyone was interested in being part of the solution he recommended attending the training on May 23, 2018, from 12:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. Kim Johnson could be contacted for more information.

Dave Stevens said he liked the Commissioners and disagreed with people who came up and knocked them.

Sam Merlino said from 5:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m. tomorrow people could come check out the election equipment in the Commission Chambers in Pahrump.
