Active Shooter in Public and Private Environments Pahrump, Nevada September 16, 2019

About the Class: The School/Public/Private Security Active Shooter Assessment abbreviated class designed by FEMA, with additional segments custom designed by NTAC is intended to orient public/private employees/owner/operators about the general modus operandi of Active Shooters. The course sponsored by Nye County (Pahrump) Justice Court and the Nevada Threat Analysis Center (NTAC) applies to Nye County employees, volunteers, and employees of other public and private workplace domains. The first module defines the term Active Shooter and examines the profile of the typical offender. The tactics, weaponry, warning signs and the pre-planning efforts of the typical Active Shooter are discussed along with various statistics in regards to the average offender. As example, case studies are presented in whole or in part in regards to Columbine, Virginian Tech, Las Vegas, San Bernardino and Sandy Hook. The case studies are intended to provide insight and instruction for future recognition of incidents which could evolve into Active Shooter episodes or other violence. In addition some preventative and intervention strategies are discussed:

The first module entitled "School Security Active Shooter Assessment" includes the following topics:

- Definition of Active Shooter and Statistics (information on Active Shooter catalysts and frequency)
- Gunman Profile (statistics on Active Shooter's ages/gender)
- Weapons and Equipment (types of firearms and weaponry associated with Active Shooters)
- Indications and Warnings (includes threats, possession of weapons, prior violent behavior, etc.)
- Tactics (commonality of tactics including acquisition and or possession of firearms, surveillance, pre-planning, motives)
- Case Studies (Columbine, Virginia Tech, Alturas, Las Vegas and Sandy Hook)
- Lessons Learned (negative and positive vs. positive reaction/response)

The second module entitled "Active Shooter: What You Can Do" includes the following topics:

- Actions to take when confronted with an Active Shooter (run, hide or fight)
- Describe actions for prevention/mitigation of potential active shooter incidents
- Explain the importance of site threat assessments, training and exercises

The Third phase of the training includes a workshop exercise and an interactive class discussion about the pre-event, event and post-event phases of an Active Shooter event & discussion of what information should go into Active Shooter Response and site plans.
